

Covid-19 - Country Restrictions and Requirements

Updated 28 July 2021

Updates in red

As the world adjusts to the presence of Covid-19, entry and exit restrictions and requirements are in a constant state of fluidity in reaction to outbreaks. It is imperative all travelers remain up-to-date and situationally aware as restrictions and requirements are subject to change with little to no notice and may be at the discretion of local authorities. Regularly monitor exemptions to entry restrictions for business/work-related travelers which may differ from that of tourists.

When testing/vaccine requirements apply, ensure the correct type of test/vaccine is utilized and it is taken within the permitted time frame.

COVID-19 Pre-Travel Restrictions Checklist:

- Destination Country restrictions
 - City/Regional level restrictions
 - Confirm entry requirements with the local embassy
 - Apply for your Visa early to allow for delays in processing/appointment times
 - Check with the supplier on their operating status and any rules in place
- Travel Itinerary – Rules & Restrictions for:
 - Airline
 - Airport
 - Public transportation, if applicable
 - Accommodations – reconfirm reservation within 24 hours of departure and any changes to rules and regulations
- Home/Onward Country restrictions
 - Entry restrictions and requirements (i.e. recent COVID tests)
 - City/Regional level restrictions (i.e. mask requirements)
- Confirm and collect all required documentation as needed, may include, but is not limited to the following:
 - Proof of essential travel:
 - Letter from employer
 - Letter from supplier



- National Interest Exception, when applicable
- Proper insurance coverage
- Proof of a negative Covid-19 test (required time frame varies by country)
- Traveler health forms – these vary by country and can almost always be filled out online. Countries differ on when this should be submitted, some require approval before entering.
- Proof of vaccination, when applicable – ensure the type and manufacturer of the vaccine is accepted in your arrival country

Commonly Traveled Country Restrictions

This list is by no means exhaustive, but rather includes some of the more commonly traveled countries for PRI auditors. Please let us know if we can look into any travel not covered here.

Country	Restrictions
Austria	<p>Entry/Exit Restrictions: Travelers from countries with a low incidence rate may enter the country without needing to self-isolate. You must have spent the past 10 days within these countries (or Austria) only.</p> <p>Travelers from all other countries can enter for certain purposes only (business travel, medical reasons, etc.). They must show:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Proof of vaccination or past infection and will NOT be required to self-isolate. ● A negative test but WILL have to quarantine for 10 days (can take PCR test after 5 days to end quarantine early). <p>Travelers from Botswana, Brazil, Eswatini, India, Lesotho, Malawi, Mozambique, Namibia, Nepal, Russia, South Africa, the United Kingdom, Uruguay, Zambia, and Zimbabwe can only enter for certain purposes only (e.g. business travel, medical reasons, etc.) Must provide:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Need to register digitally in advance to obtain pre-travel clearance, required to show proof at the border (either digitally or as a hard copy). ● A negative PCR test no older than 72 hours and ● WILL be required to quarantine for 10 days (can take a PCR test after 5 days to end quarantine early). <p>Requirements for all other travelers (entering Austria is possible from all other countries):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Must register digitally in advance to obtain a "pre-travel clearance" (PTC). and show the PTC (either digitally or as a hard copy) to border agents. Regular cross-border commuters must obtain pre-travel clearance every 28 days. ● Must show one of three documents to avoid self-isolation and pre-travel clearance requirements: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ A negative COVID test (no older than 72 hours or antigen test no older than 48 hours), ○ Proof of vaccination (All vaccines approved by EMA/WHO are recognized (read below for more vaccination requirements) ○ Proof of a past COVID infection (You can enter Austria for 6 months after a SARS-CoV-2 infection. Proof of antibodies is valid for 3 months from the test date.) ○ If you are unable to show any of these documents, you are required to take a PCR or antigen test within 24 hours of arriving in Austria. <p>Entry Exemptions: Members of diplomatic missions, employees of international organizations, humanitarian workers, nursing and health personnel, seasonal workers, transit passengers or people who work in freight transport. Those exempted must present a medical certificate or a negative test result (as outlined above)</p> <p>Quarantine Requirements/Exemptions: If arriving from Botswana, Brazil, Eswatini, India, Lesotho, Malawi, Mozambique, Namibia, Nepal, Russia, South Africa, the United Kingdom, Uruguay, Zambia, and Zimbabwe a 10-day quarantine is required (can take PCR test after 5 days to end quarantine early). If arriving from other countries who are not considered "low risk" a 10-day quarantine is only required if only a negative test result is not provided (can take a PCR test after 5 days to end quarantine early).</p> <p>Vaccine Exemptions: Those who show proof of vaccination will not have to undergo mandatory quarantine (except for travelers from Botswana, Brazil, Eswatini, India, Lesotho, Malawi, Mozambique, Namibia, Nepal, Russia, South Africa, the United Kingdom, Uruguay, Zambia, and Zimbabwe). All vaccines approved by EMA/WHO are</p>



	<p>recognized. You are considered "vaccinated" beginning the 15th day after your first dose, lasting for 3 months. After the second dose, the validity extends for another 6 months. Vaccines that only require one dose are valid from the 22nd day after that dose. EU Travel Certificate in effect. Information on "EU Digital COVID Certificates" issued in Austria</p> <p>Internal Restrictions began to relax on 19 May. (updated 22 July)</p> <p>Current as of 27 July</p>
<p>Belgium</p>	<p>Entry/Exit Restrictions: Non-essential travel within the EU+ is no longer forbidden, and follows EU guidelines. Non-essential journeys to Belgium are prohibited for people who are not nationals of one of the EU+ states and whose main residence is in a third country, except countries on the EU white list (below). An entry ban applies to travelers originating from countries classified as "very high risk".</p> <p>Travelers that have been in Brazil, South Africa or India, at any time during the past 14 days, are prohibited from entry.</p> <p>Travelers must provide:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● A mandatory passenger locator form (PLF) is required for all travelers entering Belgium and staying at least 48 hours, within 48 hours prior to arrival. As of 1 July, a PLF must also be completed for professional travel instead of the Business Travel Abroad tool (BTA) ● Travelers arriving from a "red" zone, must provide a negative PCR test the day of arrival in Belgium. ● Residents of Belgium returning from a "Very High Risk" zone after a stay of more than 48 hours must undergo a mandatory test on day 1 and day 7 of quarantine- No Exceptions. <p>Entry Exemptions: People who travel via private transportation AND who stay less than 48 hours in Belgium or who have stayed less than 48 hours outside Belgium. Cross-border workers that cross the border at least once a week. Travelers who only transit by air and who remain exclusively in the transit zone without entering Belgian territory. People with critical roles in essential sectors.</p> <p>Travelers from countries on the EU White List: Albania, Armenia, Australia, Azerbaijan, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Brunei Darussalam, Canada, Israel, Japan, Jordan, Lebanon, Montenegro, New Zealand, Qatar, Moldova, North Macedonia, Rwanda, Saudi Arabia, Serbia, Singapore, South Korea, Thailand, United States, and China, subject to confirmation of reciprocity (As of 1 July)</p> <p>Quarantine Requirements/Exemptions: A quarantine of 10 days depends on the region/country of origin.</p> <p>Arrivals from green or orange zones: with or without an EUDCC, are not subject to testing or quarantine requirements.</p> <p>Arrival from red zone countries <i>located in the EU</i>: travelers with an EUDCC do not need to quarantine.</p> <p>Arrivals from countries <i>outside the EU</i>: travelers must be fully vaccinated with an approved vaccine, and undergo a PCR test on the day of their arrival. If the test is negative, they do not need to quarantine.</p> <p>Visitors staying in Belgium for less than 48 hours do not have to go into quarantine. If quarantine is requested, it can be lifted to fulfil an essential function or to meet the essential need of the travel if this activity cannot be postponed.</p> <p>Vaccine Exemptions: As of 1 July, The EU Digital COVID Certificate is available. When traveling, holders will have the same rights as citizens who have been vaccinated, tested or recovered. Vaccines requiring two doses should be administered in the same country.</p> <p>Internal Restrictions: Face masks are mandatory in public places.</p> <p>Current as of 28 July</p>



<p>Brazil</p>	<p>Entry/Exit Restrictions: Brazil has reopened air borders. Limited direct commercial flights are operating. Brazil has closed some of its land borders, except to Brazilian citizens, resident foreign nationals and foreign spouses, children, parents or guardians of a Brazilian national. The land border with Paraguay is now open. Passengers are allowed to freely transit as long as they do not leave the international airport area and have a ticket for onward travel.</p> <p>Passengers must provide:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Travelers Health Declaration form ● Evidence of a negative PCR test taken within 72 hours prior to boarding. HOWEVER, this remains at the discretion of the country of embarkation which may require testing to be completed within 72 hours prior to landing in Brazil. or Air passengers must provide written documentation of their laboratory test result (paper or electronic) to the airline or provide documentation of having recovered from COVID-19, including a positive test result and a letter from a health professional certifying recovery. If a passenger does not provide documentation of a negative test or recovery, or chooses not to take a test, the airline will deny boarding to the passenger. <p>International flights to Brazil originating in or passing through the UK, Northern Ireland, India and South Africa are suspended. Foreign travelers departing from or passing through these countries in the last 14 days are temporarily suspended.</p> <p>Quarantine Requirements: Travelers that have been to the UK, India, or South Africa in the past 14 days will be required to quarantine for 14 days.</p> <p>Vaccine Exemptions: None at this time.</p> <p>Internal Restrictions: Restrictions vary from city to city. The use of face masks in streets, public spaces such as parks, and on public transport including taxis is mandatory across the country. There are additional local requirements for the compulsory use of masks in other places, such as shops and gyms, in various cities including São Paulo, Rio de Janeiro, Belo Horizonte and Brasília. Social isolation measures have been lifted to an extent in some parts of the country, but localized lockdowns continue to varying degrees. Failing to comply may result in a fine.</p> <p>Current as of 28 July</p>
<p>Canada</p>	<p>Entry/Exit Restrictions: Non-essential travel remains prohibited until at least 8 Aug. On 9 August, vaccinated US citizens and legal residents who reside in the US are permitted entry for nonessential travel and will <u>not</u> be required to quarantine as long as the following requirements are met:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Final dose of vaccine must be completed at least 14 days prior to entry and proof of vaccination submitted to ArriveCan and may be required to report daily during their stay. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Accepted vaccines: Pfizer/BioNTech, Moderna, AstraZeneca and Johnson & Johnson ● Fully vaccinated travelers will not need a post-arrival test unless they have been randomly selected at the port of entry to complete a Covid-19 molecular test ● All travelers coming into Canada, regardless of vaccine status, will need a negative PCR or molecular test within 72 hours of entry. <p>All other vaccinated foreign nationals are expected to be permitted entry as of 7 September.</p> <p>Travelers must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Travelers must use ArriveCan before boarding a flight to Canada to submit travel and contact information, quarantine plan, and COVID-19 self-assessment. ● Travelers must report daily during the stay. ● All travelers crossing the land border will be required to provide proof of a negative COVID-19 molecular test result taken in the US within 72 hours of arrival or a positive test taken 14 to 90 days prior to arrival.



	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Travelers by air, 5 years or older, will be required to take a COVID-19 molecular test when they arrive in Canada before exiting the airport ● Air travelers will also be required to reserve, prior to departure to Canada, a 3-night stay in a government-authorized hotel. <p>Entry restrictions and requirements may vary by Province: Alberta, Saskatchewan, British Columbia, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia</p> <p>Contact the supplier for testing locations as cost and provider may vary across provinces.</p> <p>Flights from India remain suspended until 21 July.</p> <p>Entry Exemptions: Essential Business. Individuals that install, inspect, repair or maintain equipment to support critical infrastructure. Exemption will be validated for each entry. Temporary workers arriving from anywhere, must prove they are listed as being exempted from travel restrictions; are traveling for a non-discretionary (essential) purpose; are not presenting signs or symptoms of COVID-19; and have a plan to quarantine for 14 days, unless exempted.</p> <p>Foreign nationals who have obtained an exemption to enter Canada, will be refused entry, with limited exceptions, if they do not have a valid COVID-19 molecular test result.</p> <p>Quarantine Exemptions: Travelers are subject to mandatory self-quarantine for 14 days, with the exception of essential employees (medical staff or employees in the trade, transportation or critical infrastructure sectors). Border control agents determine an individual's eligibility for entry and/or exemptions. A molecular test must be taken on day 8 of the 14-day quarantine period.</p> <p>Vaccine Exemptions: As of 5 July, fully vaccinated travelers who are permitted to enter Canada will not be subject to the federal requirement to quarantine, a hotel stopover (for air travelers), and day-8 testing requirement. Fully vaccinated travelers must still meet all other mandatory requirements, including pre- and on-arrival testing. Current travel restrictions still apply.</p> <p>Beginning 9 August, vaccinated US Citizens and permanent residents will be permitted entry without the need to quarantine, while all other vaccinated foreign nationals are expected to be granted entry on 7 September.</p> <p>To be considered fully vaccinated, you must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Be eligible to enter Canada. Visit this website to determine your eligibility. ● Have received the full series of an accepted COVID-19 vaccine or a combination of accepted vaccines: Pfizer-BioNTech, Moderna, AstraZeneca/COVISHIELD, Janssen (Johnson & Johnson) - single dose ● Have received your last dose at least 14 days prior to the day you enter Canada ● Upload your proof of vaccination in ArriveCAN <p>Internal Restrictions: Masks may be mandatory in public spaces.</p> <p>Current as of 28 July</p>
<p>China</p>	<p>Entry/Exit Restrictions: Prior to entry to China travelers must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Apply for a visa: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Foreign nationals involved in essential activities may apply for visas at Chinese embassies or consulates. ○ Holders of valid residence permits attached to work, personal matters and reunion can re-enter China. ○ Holders of expired residence permits can apply for a new one. You should check the eligibility of your visa with a Chinese Embassy or Consulate before booking travel. ● Submit a Health Declaration Form, a certificate of a negative Covid-19 test and an IgM antibody test taken within 48 hours of departing for China (specified as a 'nucleic acid' test by Chinese authorities) and submit the results to their local Chinese Embassy/Consulate



	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Passengers who are transiting another country for a connecting flight must take both tests a second time in their last transit country within 48 hours before boarding the plane to China. Passengers must apply from the Chinese Embassies/Consulates in BOTH countries (the U.S. and the last transit country) for green health codes with the "HS" mark or certified health declaration forms with their certificates of negative results of both tests. List of countries where China-bound passengers are required to show a negative Covid-19 test before boarding. ○ Travelers from the U.S. will have to present tests from specific laboratories. <u>Consulates will publish their lists separately</u>; further details to be found here (list published 5 Jan 21). ○ Travelers leaving Guangdong Province are required to show proof of a negative PCR Covid-19 test within 48 hours of their departure. ● Apply for a green health code with the "HS" mark or a certified health declaration form (after testing). Foreign passengers can apply for the QR code by logging on to the official website. (Includes US travelers) ● Officials have ended entry restrictions on most areas of Guangdong but require travelers from the province to present a negative test result taken within 48 hours of arrival. Travelers from medium- and high-risk areas of mainland China must quarantine for 14 days at designated hotels. As of 6 July, the requirements are in place for travelers from the following locations: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Guangdong Province: Dashi Subdistrict, Panyu District, Guangzhou ○ Yunnan Province: Dehong Dai and Jingpo Autonomous Prefecture, Ruili City <p>As of 24 December 2020: All direct flights from the UK to mainland China have been suspended. This measure will be subject to a future review but no date has been given. British nationals traveling to China from a third country should follow the directions on the website of the local Chinese Embassy or consulate for requirements from that country.</p> <p>Non-compliance can result in prison.</p> <p>Entry Exemptions: Foreign travelers who provide essential services and holders of valid residence permits</p> <p>Quarantine Rules/Exemptions: All travelers who enter China, are screened upon arrival and subject to a 7-14-day quarantine. Restrictions regarding domestic travel tightened slightly due to increased cases; local quarantine requirements can vary significantly between cities, and regulations can change very quickly. All international arrivals should be prepared to complete quarantine at a government-selected facility or hotel at their own expense, with no control over the amenities, even if they maintain a residence in China. Cities and provinces within China may also require quarantine for domestic travelers, regardless of nationality. Foreign visitors may also be required to install and use location tracking software on their phones in order to access public spaces and some businesses. Please consult local authorities on specific quarantine requirements.</p> <p>Vaccine Exemptions: China accepts US Travelers inoculated with American-made vaccines (Pfizer, Moderna, and Johnson & Johnson). US passengers vaccinated with American-made non-inactivated vaccines may depart from Dallas and enter the Chinese mainland. Passengers must get all the required shots before their trip to China. China-bound passengers are also required to provide positive IgM antibody test results as well as negative nucleic acid test results.</p> <p>Internal Restrictions: vary by province and city Current as of 28 July</p>
Czech Republic	<p>Entry/Exit Restrictions: The Ministry of Health Protective Measure labels countries low, med, and high risk. Information regarding the labeling can be found here (updated 23 July). All travelers will be required to fill out the Passenger Locator Form.</p>



Since 5 January, UK citizens may only enter for certain essential reasons and for those with residency or valid long-term visas:

- A negative RT-PCR or antigen test taken in the UK within 72 hours of departure is required for all those who have spent more than 12 hours during the previous 14 days in the UK.
- On arrival, you must self-isolate for at least 5 days, before taking another RT-PCR test between 5-7 days after arrival. A negative test result will end self-isolation.

Entry Exemptions: None

Quarantine/Testing Exemptions: Rules regarding Czech citizens and foreigners with a Czech Republic residence permit, EU+ citizens and foreign nationals with a valid long-term or permanent residence permit for residence in the EU+ countries:

- If arriving from a country that is a green country, you must submit a negative antigen test within 24 hours of departure or PCR test within 72 hours of departure, but no quarantine is required.
- If arriving from an orange country, you will have to submit a negative antigen test within 24 hours of departure or PCR test within 72 hours of departure, but no quarantine is required.
- If you are arriving from a red country, if arriving from a dark red country, you must submit a PCR test within 72 hours prior to departure, followed by a second PCR test in the Czech Republic after 5 days in-country; self-isolation is required until a negative PCR test is submitted no earlier than the 5th day.
- If arriving from a dark red country, you must submit a PCR test within 72 hours prior to departure, followed by a second PCR test in the Czech Republic after 5 days in-country; self-isolation is required until a negative PCR test is submitted no earlier than the 5th day. If a country is not specifically listed it is considered a very high risk country "dark red".
- If arriving from a grey country, a negative antigen test taken within 24 hours of departure or a PCR test taken within 72 hours of departure AND a PCR test taken within 24 hours of arrival and a second PCR test taken no sooner than the 10th day after arrival is required. Self-isolation may end when a negative PCR test is submitted no earlier than the 10th day.

The conditions of entry in regards to **other foreign nationals:**

- Find out if you are allowed to enter the Czech Republic according to the [MoH Protective Measures](#). If you are, then:
- If arriving from a green country, you must submit a negative antigen test within 24 hours of departure or PCR test within 72 hours of departure, but no quarantine is required.
- If arriving from an orange country, then a negative antigen (not longer than 48 hours) or PCR test (no longer than 72 hours before starting travel) is required prior to entry.
- If arriving from a red country, a negative PCR test (no longer than 72 hours before starting travel) is required prior to entry and a PCR test within 5 days after arrival. Self-isolation will be required until receiving a negative result of the test undergone in Czechia.
- If arriving from a dark red country, a negative PCR test (no longer than 72 hours before starting travel) is required prior to entry and a PCR test within 5 days after arrival. Self-isolation will be required until receiving a negative result of the test undergone in Czechia.
- Entry from a grey country is currently banned.

Vaccine Exemptions: As of 21 June, the rules regarding Czech citizens and foreigners with a Czech Republic residence permit, EU+ citizens and foreign nationals with a valid long-term or permanent residence permit for residence in the EU+ countries and



	<p>arriving from a medium risk or high risk country may qualify for exemptions of testing and isolation requirements if:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Person who had COVID-19 in the last 180 days (must have written medical certificate in english from EU+ country where the isolation was completed) ● Person vaccinated in the EU+ countries (22 days after application of a first dose or after 14 days in case of one-dose vaccination (in is necessary to have a national certificate)) ● Czech citizens and EU+ citizens with certificate of temporary residence or permanent residence permit in Czechia fully vaccinated in a third country with the EMA approved vaccination (it is necessary to have a certificate) <p>As of 21 June, the conditions of entry as regards other foreign nationals and arriving from a medicume risk or high risk country may qualify for exemptions of testing and isolation is:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Person who had COVID-19 in the last 180 days (it is necessary to have a written medical certificate in English from EU+ country where the isolation was completed) ● Person vaccinated in the EU+ countries (22 days after application of a first dose or 14 days in case of one-dose vaccination (it is necessary to have a national certificate)) <p>EU Travel Certificate in effect. Information on "EU Digital COVID Certificates" issued in Czech Republic</p> <p>Internal Restrictions: Internal Restrictions are in place. On 10 May and 1 July the government approved additional relaxation of measures.</p> <p>Current as of 27 July</p>
<p>European Union</p>	<p>Entry/Exit Restrictions: EU Member States may begin lifting restrictions on non-essential travel into the EU for residents of the following third countries (see link for complete list): Australia, Canada, Israel, Japan, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Singapore, South Korea, Thailand, Ukraine, the United States, and China (subject to confirmation of reciprocity) (Updated 20 May)</p> <p>Despite European Commission recommendations, each country within the EU still reserves the right to implement their own restrictions or exemptions for entry from third countries.</p> <p>All EU member states are expected to join the EUDCC initiative (see below) by 1 July; however, there will be a phase-in period until mid-August while Member States develop the capacity to issue their own EUDCCs. EU citizens must obtain the certificate in the country where they received the approved vaccine. - All passengers should submit a self-declaration form on the [online portal](#) at least 72 hours before the scheduled travel.
- All the passengers arriving from the U.K, Europe, and the Middle East. should carry a Negative RT-PCR Test Report conducted within 72 hours prior to departure. The same also shall be uploaded on the [online portal](#)
- Airlines will require proof of a negative test report before allowing the passenger to board the flight.
- All the travelers arriving from/transiting through flights originating in the United Kingdom, Europe or Middle East shall be mandatorily subjected to self-paid confirmatory molecular tests on arrival at the Indian airports concerned (port of entry). Entry made in the SDF regarding telephone number and address would be reconfirmed.
- Travelers from Brazil, South Africa and the United Kingdom, testing positive (either at the airport or subsequently during home quarantine period or their contacts who turn positive) shall be isolated in an institutional isolation facility in a separate (isolation) unit coordinated by the respective State Health Authorities. They would earmark specific facilities for such isolation and treatment and take necessary action to send the positive samples to Indian SARS-CoV-2 Genomics Consortium (INSACOG) Labs

Lockdown restrictions remain in containment zones until 31 July.

Entry Exemptions: Foreign businessmen coming to India on a Business Visa, Foreign Healthcare professionals, health researchers, engineers and technicians, Foreign Engineering, Managerial, Design or other Specialists.

- If you test positive, you will be treated in a Vietnamese hospital. However, the Ministry of Health has ordered localities to continue quarantining all entrants who have completed 14-day mandatory quarantine, applicable from 4 May at both State and civilian quarantine sites for an as yet undetermined length of time.
- Quarantine is at the expense of the company the traveler is coming to work for or the traveler themselves. Once you have completed quarantine and self-isolation you should receive a document specifying this. You should keep this, as you may need to present it to customs/airport officials when you leave.
- From 1-31 July, the Vietnamese government will initiate a pilot program allowing individuals entering Vietnam **via Quang Ninh Province** to quarantine in centralized facilities for only 7 days instead of the normal 21 days if these entrants have received full COVID-19 vaccinations. Please note that these discussions will take time and policies are subject to adjustments based on the specific outbreak situation of Vietnam.

Vaccine Exemptions: None at this time.

Internal Restrictions: Vietnam uses community testing as a means to provide assurance that COVID-19 is not being transmitted undetected. Should you be asked to undertake testing, you should comply. Failure to comply can be an offence with significant punishments.

There are restrictions, curfews and closures in place in Hanoi, Ho Chi Minh City, Da Nang, Thai Binh and Bac Ninh City. Other localities may also have restrictions in place. There may be self-quarantine requirements in place for intercity travel.

Starting from midnight on 9 July 2021, Ho Chi Minh City will apply social distancing measures under Directive 16 for 15 days.

In accordance with the Directive, you should ensure you are strictly following the social distancing rules in place. These include but are not limited to:

- Staying at home and only going outside for essential needs such as food shopping, obtaining medicine, or urgent medical services
- Ban on gatherings of more than two people at public places.
- Suspension of public transportation
- Ban on traveling to other localities
